TIPS FOR TEACHING PARENTS

Memory work is not just busy work. It's not just something to keep the kids working. Memorization is a teaching method. Some educators think it among the best of the basic approaches to learning. Military training, for example, uses repetition and memory work in almost all subjects.

Memory work is useless, of course, if the student does not understand what she is memorizing. Be sure your children know the meaning of the verses. For each lesson in this series we select memory verses that tie in with the main truth in the story. We need to explain all the hard words in each verse and then have our kids tell us how the verse applies to the story they are studying.

Memory work is hard. Consequently, our children often rebel against it, just as all of us rebel against work at times. Firm parental insistence may be necessary to keep the memory work going. In general, however, we should try to make the memory work as much fun as possible. If we can find ways to make it a challenge to our kids, and if we praise them sincerely for their accomplishments in learning the verses, they will respond positively most of the time. All children covet parental approval. Compliments to kids are like peanuts to monkeys. They bring out the most unbelievable tricks. When our children excel in something like this, they are happier with themselves and with us. So the memory work with these lessons can produce all sorts of benefits for your family.
